Grade Categories and Distribution

30% - Classroom Assignments - Typical classroom assignments include assessments from your textbook, worksheets, study guides/guided notes, copying flashcard terms + definitions and Binder Checks.

10% - Participation - There are many opportunities to participate in class discussions, group work, and review games. Respectful communication is expected of each student.

50% - Tests - Tests will be frequent. Expect to be tested on new flashcard terms, textbook chapters, longer units of study as well as the Midterm and Final! Should you earn a failing grade on any test, your recess/PE time may be taken to provide remediation as needed.

10% - Homework - There is a weekly current event assignment, but other homework may be given as well. *Expect to finish classroom assignments for homework if not completed during class* - these will always be due the following day they were assigned.
